Prolife Essay Scholarship 2025

The Award:

Right to Life of Michigan Educational Fund will award a non-renewable \$500 scholarship to one prolife high school senior in Michigan. The award may be used towards tuition, books, and/or college supplies.

Eligibility:

Any Michigan student who is a high school senior for the Fall, or Winter/Spring semesters of the 2024/2025 school year.

Selection:

Selection criteria include the student's application and the essay. Applications and essays will be judged by each Right to Life of Michigan affiliate, and then one student from each affiliate will be nominated to a state committee for consideration. Affiliates must send the chosen application and essay to the State Office, and it must be postmarked no later than *Wednesday*, *April* 30, 2025. The winner will be selected by the state committee. An excerpt of the winning essay will appear in the Right to Life of Michigan News and on our website, rtl.org.

Requirements:

400-500 words

Prompt: Reflect on areas where you believe your character has grown throughout your journey as a young prolife advocate and how this influences your future goals.

All applications and essays must be submitted to the local affiliate. If you are unsure of your local affiliate, contact the state office at migenleads@rtl.org.

Planning and Promoting the Prolife Essay Scholarship

Important Things to Know

- This essay scholarship is only for high school seniors.
- The essay must be 500 words or more, typed.
- If there is no active affiliate in the student's county, their application and essay are sent directly to migenleads@rtl.org. From these essays, one essay per county will be chosen to compete in the state contest.
- First-place essays must be submitted to the state office by **Wednesday**, **April 30**, **2025**, along with the student's application.
- The scoring sheet included <u>must</u> be used to ensure fair opportunity. Please turn in the scoring sheet to the State Office with the student's application and essay.

Contest Planning Points

- Announce the essay scholarship to your youth and students for life groups as soon as possible. Set a deadline for their application submission and make sure any interested students know about it.
- You can choose a committee to decide on a nomination. An odd number of members is best to break
 any ties. Committee members should generally not be immediate relatives of any students who
 applied. Only one essay can be sent to the state office per affiliate.
- Your affiliate does not have to give the student an award for winning at the local level. If you wish to, we recommend a gift basket and a certificate.

Promoting the Prolife Essay Scholarship

- 1. Appoint a volunteer in your affiliate to oversee the Prolife Essay Scholarship. It can be a great way to get another member actively involved in your group. This volunteer can announce the contest to youth, promote it, and help recruit committee members to decide on a nomination.
- 2. Announce the contest early. High school seniors are often looking for scholarship contests in January until the end of the school year.
- 3. Develop a flyer announcing the contest. Post it in schools, churches and areas/businesses where youth spend time. Make sure to include the deadline and contact information on any materials promoting the contest.
- 4. Many churches have youth group leaders or youth pastors.
- 5. Contact home-school groups. Let the parents know of the contest, and ask to have information about the Youth Award included in a home-school network email.
- 6. Inform parents and others in your affiliate and personal networks. College is not getting any cheaper, and many parents pay for some or all of their child's tuition and books.
